This Weekly Update is intended to provide useful and timely updates to the Gridley Community, Visitors, our Elected Officials, and our City Coworkers. We regret if we have inadvertently omitted useful items from this report. As always, your input and guidance are appreciated. Please send any response to me directly and do not "copy all."

Finance

- The City Administrator, Finance Department, Information Technology, and Electric and Public Works Leadership are currently working to improve our Utility Billing Processes.
- The Finance Department is very active with financial year end closing; preparation for the annual audit and onsite work; development of a wide array of grant responsibilities; payroll and benefits issues; worker's compensation cases; and organization of all work areas and file systems.

- The City's transit vehicle use is described below. This service is in addition to the Butte County Transit System that serves Gridley and the region.

Electric Utility

Safety Training - Annual employee training was completed this week. Training topics included: Safe handling of chemicals and hazardous waste; Personal Protective Equipment (PPE); Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS); Tags/labels; Record keeping; Emergency response instructions; Fire extinguishers; Safety shower and eye wash station; etc.

- Following up on the training, Crews went through and organized storage for oil rags and filters and trained on proper storage and location. Labels and record keeping on site location of oil material were updated.
- Substation During an inspection Crewmembers discovered a malfunction on the T-1 Backup Substation's Transformer Load Tap Changer (LTC). The LTC drive motor would engage but the unit would not change the tap setting. Upon further inspection it was discovered a roll pin on a drive sprocket had sheered allowing the sprocket to spin on the drive shaft. Crewmembers were able to make the necessary repairs by draining the LTC unit and replacing the roll pin. During the repair it was also discovered the drive motor mounting bracket had bent. Crews were able to make temporary repairs to the bracket. A replacement LTC drive motor has been ordered.
- 12 KV Maintenance During a routine switching procedure, Crewmembers discovered air switch #3059 was out of adjustment. The switch is used to bypass the Voltage Restorer (VR) located outside the Substation. Adjustment of the switch will be completed as time permits. Crews continued with the tree trimming around the 12KV primary lines in preparation for the winter months ahead.
- Substation and LR inspections Substation and LR inspections were completed this week.
- After Hours Call Out On call personnel were dispatched to Norman Street to restore power after customer was shut-off for non-payment.
- Meter Tests Due to high August electric bill concerns, Crewmembers tested five electrical meters. All the meters tested "Good".
- City of Biggs Crewmembers demonstrated how to "BOOT" an electrical meter to two Biggs Public Works employees. The demonstration included a recommendation to have the Biggs staff seek training if the intention was to have Public Works personnel perform the Booting of electrical meters.
- Biggs Mill City of Biggs requested meter information be downloaded from the SunWest Milling meters.
- T-3 Substation As part of the final inspection testing for the T-3 Substation project, Crewmembers, along with R&DB and Associates, preformed an infrared test on all the bus connection on the new T-3 substation project. All connections and switches passed.
- Projects The Crews will be planning the following upcoming projects: Holiday lighting for Downtown; Trimming trees around the 12,000volt primary lines in Gridley and Biggs; Replacement of T-1 LTC drive motor; Replacement of the Substation distribution circuit breakers; Transfer of the T-1 Relays to the new relay room; Reareasement pole replacements on Sage Street; LED street light replacement program; and Wiring the lights at the Biggs Little league parking lot.

- Employees continue safety and physical training and new employees are currently training to become Truck Operators.

- Firefighters and Gridley area resident Volunteer Firefighters. Our Volunteers meet regularly for training. Training is conducted cooperatively with Butte County Fire and includes all basic firefighting skills: first aid, ladders, breathing apparatus use, hose streams, vehicle extrication, etc. This ongoing training is in addition to the initial basic operations training course. Police

- Animal Control personnel are encouraging our community canine owners to license their dogs. This provides a great record for any pet owner if they should lose their dog and enables Animal Control staff to find and return their pet.
- Animal Control continues to provide proactive patrol and compassion for lost/stray animals.
- Police personnel have been focusing enforcement on community property theft crimes. The goal is to deter local property theft activity.
- Police patrol was active in both communities of Gridley and Biggs. The Department served several local arrest warrants during the week.
- Notables Department personnel have been enhancing the Department's Internet web page to provide forms for commonly used applications, licenses, permits and informational resources. This is an on-going effort to provide the communities we serve with useful information, resources and an efficient means to obtain City services.
- Police personnel attended POST Instructor's Course. This course instructs police officers on how to develop and instruct in-house police officer training that meets POST standards.
- Police patrol personnel have provided more foot patrol and have been active in Daddow Park and Vierra Park. The Police Department continues to encourage safe and responsible experiences while visiting our community parks.
- The Department has been focused on long-term inoperable and abandoned vehicles in both the City of Gridley and the City of Biggs. Some vehicles have been lawfully removed to ensure clean, safe streets for our communities.
- The Department continues in its goal to provide quality service in all aspects of public safety to the citizens we serve. The August 2017 statistics are provided below:

Recommendation

Hold a public hearing to allow the public a forum to comment on potential Community Development Block Grant application that may be developed and submitted in 2017.

Background

The City of Gridley is considering applying for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds through the 2017 CDBG Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) that was issued on September 1, 2017 by the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). Eligible cities and counties may submit applications for 2017 CDBG NOFA allowing for two activities at a maximum of \$5,000,000. Eligible activities consist of Homeownership Assistance and Housing Rehabilitation programs, Public Facility and Public Improvements projects (including public improvements in support of new housing construction), Public Service programs, Planning and Technical Assistance studies, Economic Development Business Assistance and Microenterprise activities (The Economic Development "Over-the-Counter" (OTC) allocation requires a separate application with a maximum limit of \$3,000,000 per year) and Native American and Colonia's activities.

Every CDBG-funded activity must meet one of the following three National Objectives: benefit to low- and moderate-income persons; prevention or elimination of slums or blight; or meeting urgent community development need.

Discussion

HCD requires jurisdictions to adequately allow for public participation and comments regarding such programs. Holding a public hearing is part of the mandatory process.
